PROPOSED EXTRACTION OF MATERIAL - HAWKESBURY RIVER, NORTH RICHMOND

Recommendation

It is recommended that tenders be called for the extraction of material from the site on the basis that:

- the material is removed through the eastern side of the river with no works being undertaken at all on the western side;
- access is to be provided by the successful tenderer;
- the tenderer is to provide all materials and equipment necessary for the operation;
- the tender is subject to the approval of a development application and any conditions imposed therein; including a security bond for compliance with conditions.

REPORT TO EXTRACTIVE INDUSTRY COMMITTEE

SUBJECT: Extraction of material - Hawkesbury River, North Richmond

Council is the owner of land in the bed of the Hawkesbury River at North Richmond upstream from the North Richmond Bridge generally opposite the residential subdivision of Keda Circuit. This section of the river is the only section in the locality that has not been subject to extraction.

Preliminary investigations have indicated the desirability to extract the sand and gravel in this section to maintain uniformity in the river's cross-section.

The initial assessment also indicated that avenues to remove the material through the eastern side of the river are limited. Early action is, therefore, essential if the material is to be removed and through the eastern side of the river.

A development application is currently being prepared and, at the same time, it is desirable to call tenders for the removal of the material so that when, and if, an application is approved, Council is in a position to have it removed expeditiously with minimal interference to the surrounding area.

Initial plans will be available to the meeting with a recommendation for action in calling tenders for the work.
